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Roam Like A Dinosaur In The Echo Caverns In Pennsylvania

Of course, you can't avoid the trips to chocolate production centers and sweet shops, while visiting Hershey, Pennsylvania. Although, if you can pry yourself away, you should explore the outdoors. Just 10 minutes outside of Hershey is a series of caverns which have been explored by many. Include yourself within those many explorers and make your way to Indian Echo Caverns in Hummelstown, Pennsylvania.

The Susquehannock Indians once used these caves as a place of refuge from the encroaching dangers in the 17th century. After being vacated by the natives, French fur trappers found the area in the late 1600s and laid claim to its borders. Once they caught all the fur they could get, they left and an old hermit took over the cave for 19 years. When they next became empty, they were made available for ordinary folks to enjoy. And thankfully it has remained that way; a public attraction to satisfy the interests of many.

What you'll first notice, walking through the entrance is an emblem of a Susquehannock Indian, titled Chief Kumsee that points you to the ticket office. A gift shop sells tickets to the cavern tours. As soon as you've bought your tickets, there are a number of additional things to enjoy until you're ready to go in. You'll encounter an area where you'll be able to look for gemstones, along with a small petting zoo to certainly occupy you while you look forward to your cave experience.

Crowded with crevices, stalactites and stalagmites, these caverns boast 440 million years of age. The 45-minute tour takes you through the caverns as the escort recounts the histories of all the areas. There is an Indian Ballroom, a tunnel in pitch darkness and a Wedding Chapel, which is a small cave with grand, radiant sculptures which remarkably similar to a wedding cake. Approximately 40 weddings have taken place at this spot.

As your excursion winds up, you will be lead back to the great opening from which you came. Its notable for its majesty, not only due to its natural manifestations which are incredible, but as a result of its prehistoric identity. Dinosaurs stomped across the top of these caverns. And not only is it interesting to know that these caves are older than dinosaurs, they are fun to climb through. The only precautionary measure to take, is to wear closed toed shoes and keep an eye open for water.
